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1. Introduction

About this manual

This User Manual provides information on installation setup and operation of the video server, as well as how to manage troubleshooting.

Features

A Video server is a video and audio transmission system that provides broadcast quality audio and video, based on IP network through LAN and ADSL/VDSL. Video server operates in an Encoder mode. Encoder system compresses media data and transmits them.

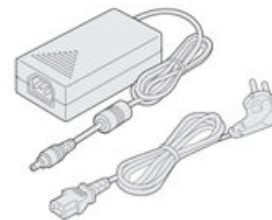

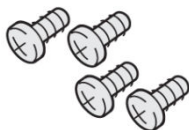

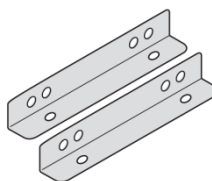

System Connections

Video server operates as one mode; Encoder. Video server can be connected in either 1-to-1 fashion where one encoder is connected one decoder or 1-to-many fashion where one encoder connected to many decoders.

Following chart shows data status of video, audio and serial data.

System Mode	Video	Audio	Serial Data

The system mode is defined by the video communication and the system mode is capable of single directional transmission of audio and bi-directional of serial data.

Topology

Generally, the encoder and a decoder are connected in 1-to-1 mode. To support specific situation, 1-to-multiple connection is also supported.

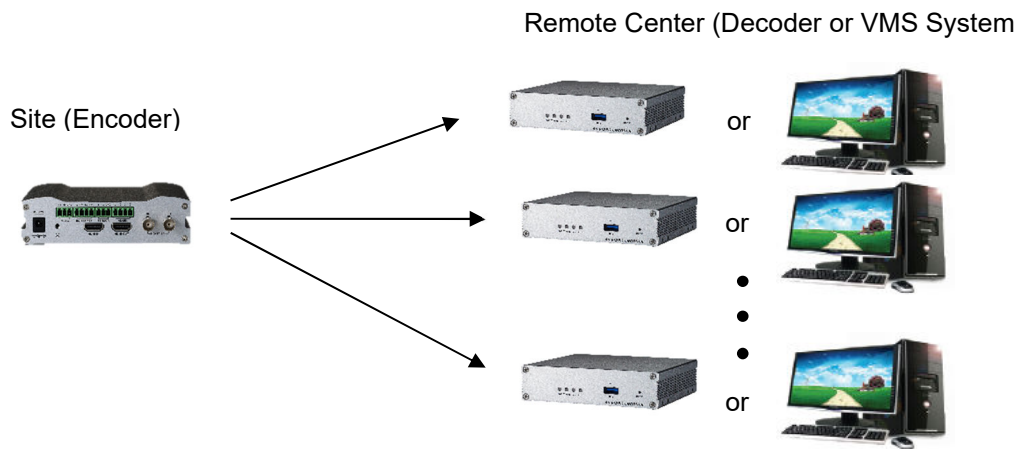
- **1:1 Connection (Unidirectional Transmission).**



The most commonly used configuration is 1 to 1 connection. An encoder is installed at a site where video images can be transmitted and a decoder is installed at a center location to receive and view the video images on monitors. Audio and serial data are transferred in either direction.

A decoder and encoder can be connected by setting of the encoder's address at the decoder's remote IP.

- **1:N Connection (Unidirectional Transmission).**



In this configuration, a site can be monitored from many remote center locations. Maximum connections would be limited by the network bandwidth.

Functionally, the VMS (Video Management System) software can be replaced as the decoder.

Multicast Mode

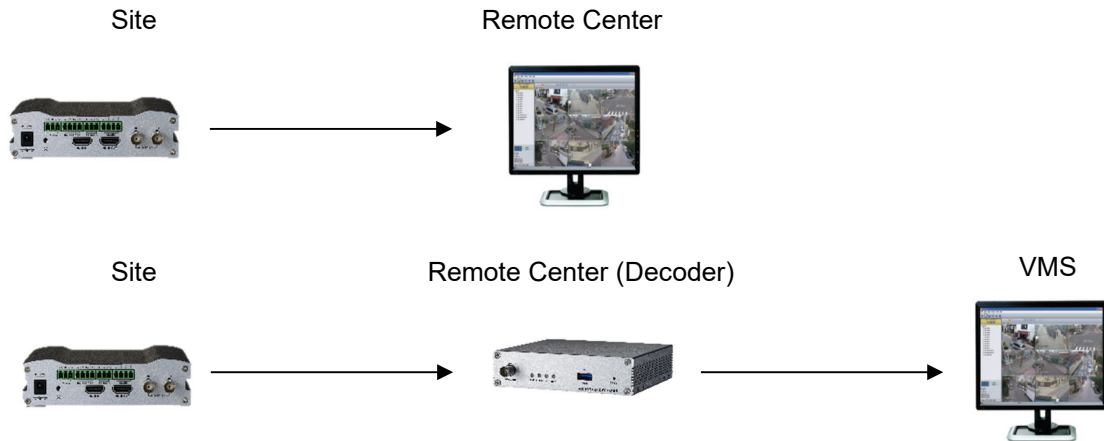
In the network supporting multicast mode, if **Multicast** is setup as a system protocol, you can use bandwidth efficiently regardless of the number of decoders. In 1:N connection, a large number of decoders can receive audio and video data from an encoder by using a single streaming transmission.

- **Relaying**



In this arrangement, video and audio can be retransmitted from a center to another center. The arrangement is useful when the network bandwidth at the site is limited while there is more than one center wanting to monitor the site.

- **VMS(Video Management System)**



VMS (Video Management System) that supports Onvif is a Windows based remote monitoring program to access multiple encoders for real-time monitoring or control of the encoders and connected cameras.

2. Installation

Connecting Video

- Encoder system mode

Connect camera or other video source such as computer's video output line to the encoder (video server) video input port. HDMI cable ver. is 2.2.

Connecting Audio

It is possible to set the mode as Tx-only, Rx-only, Tx-Rx or audio off.

- Connect audio input and output ports to audio devices accordingly.
- The Audio signal required is line level, so audio equipment with an amp, mixer or other amplifier should be used.
- Embedded audio over HDMI is supported.

Connecting Serial Ports

- For camera control, PTZ controller (keyboard) and receiver can be connected to serial ports. Two corresponding serial ports in encoder and decoder which are connected in 1-to-1 fashion works in pass-through mode. This means that commands at a local system's COM1 port will be transparently passed to the remote system's COM1 port. Also, a command at a local system COM2 port will pass to the remote system's COM2 port.

Connecting Sensor and Alarm

- Connect sensor and alarm devices to corresponding terminals accordingly.

Connecting Power

- After confirming the power source, connect power adaptor and connect the 12VDC connector to the system.
- Also PoE (Power over Ethernet) is supported.

Check if it Works

- Once the power is supplied to the camera, it will start booting. The system will boot up to an operating mode after approximately 40-60 seconds. The green LED on the Ethernet port will flash indicating the system is ready. Software called True Manager allows you to check the IP address and other network details of the camera. Please refer to the True Manager manual for instructions on how to find the IP address of the camera and if required changing it.

Remote Video Monitoring

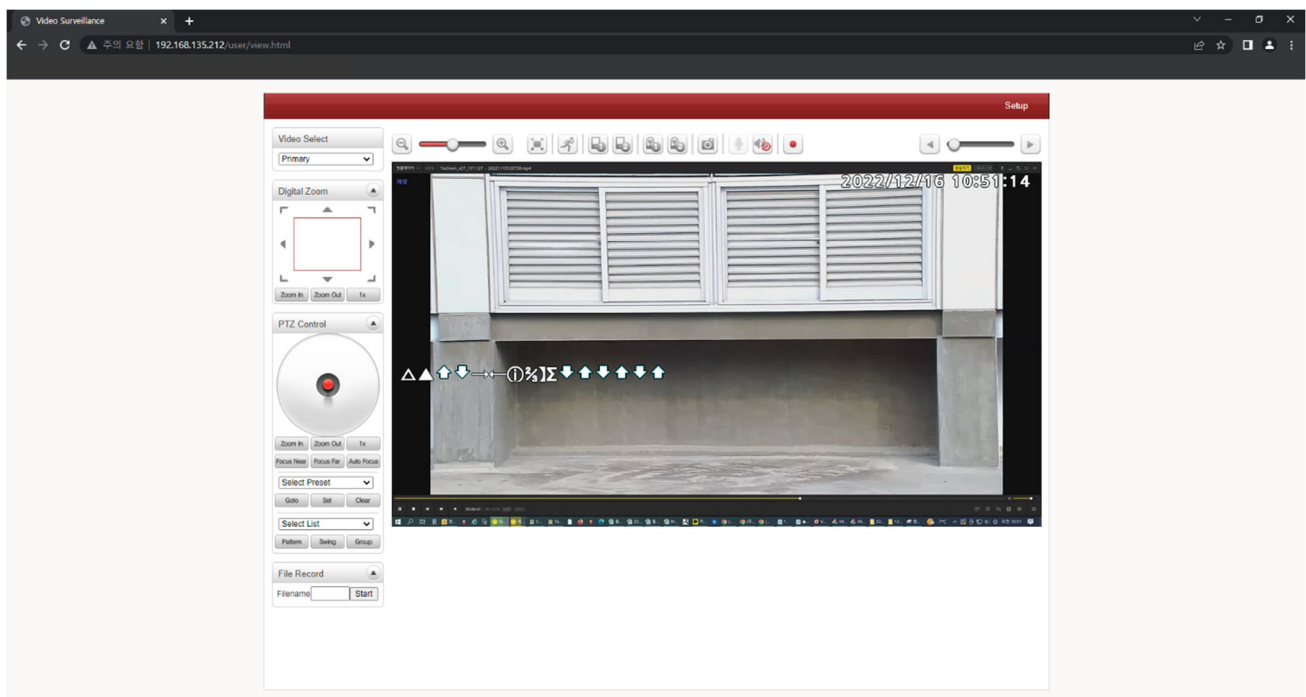
- There are two ways to monitor video when the center system and IP camera are connected. In order for a proper operation, an IP address must be set accordingly. Default password is requested modification for better security. Please refer to True Manager program for further details.

- **Default ID** : admin
- **Default Password** :1234

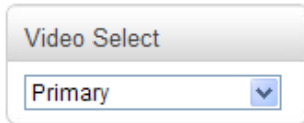
Video Monitoring using Google Chrome

- Open Google Chrome and enter camera's IP address. Once authorized, Google Chrome will start to display video images from camera as shown below.

- **Default IP Address** : http://192.168.10.100



◆ **Video Select**



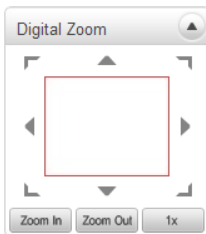
- Select the Video stream to be viewed: Primary, Secondary #1, #2, #3.
- This video server is capable of quadruple streaming; primary streaming and secondary streaming #1~#3.
- Video will be displayed according to the resolution set on video configuration. If dual or quadruple streaming (“Use Dual Encode” Menu in Video page) is not activated, secondary video is not available

◆ **View Size**



- Adjust the size of the screen on the browser. Screen size is initially adjusted according to the resolution of video page

◆ **Digital Zoom**



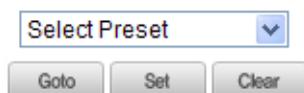
- Control the Digital zoom on the screen. The more the camera zooms in, the smaller the square of control panel is. Position of the image can be changed by moving position of the square. If you press x1, the screen will return to the normal size.

◆ **PTZ Control**



- Control PTZ and PTZ Control Panel is used for controlling external PTZ devices when the external PTZ device is connected through serial port. It is possible to make zooming control by Zoom in/out buttons of PTZ control Panel (In order to use digital zoom, select Digital zoom ON in the Camera tab)
- Focus Near, Focus Far, Auto Focus
Adjust the focus of the lens

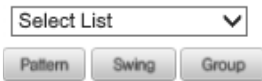
◆ **Select Preset**



- Set preset position and move to the specific preset position if PTZ Camera is connected to Video Server via Serial Port Set
- Goto
Move to the selected preset entry if the preset entry is set.
- Set
Set the current position to the selected preset entry.
- Clear
Delete the selected preset entry.

◆ **Select List**

- Pattern, Swing, Group can be activated as configured PTZ Page.



◆ **Sensor Input and Alarm Output**



- Display the status of the sensor in real time. When the sensor of the video server is working, the sensor light turns red and you can operate the alarm device by pressing the number icon. A number icon indicates status of the alarm device.

◆ **Snapshot**



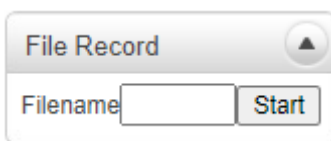
- Capture video images and store them as BMP or JPEG files.

◆ **Talk**



- Transfer audio from PC's mic to the camera

◆ **File Record**



- Recording to an AVI file on Live View page is available. AVI files are generated in the Download folder with a specified file name on the PC where web browser is running.
 1. Enter the file name on a filename field.
 2. Press "**Start**" button to start recording.
 3. Press "**Stop**" button to stop recording.
 4. An AVI file named "**IP address_hh_mm_ss**" or "**File name_IP address_hh_mm_ss**" will be generated in the Download folder.

◆ **Display Buffer**



- Set the number of video frames to be buffered before being displayed on web browser. Larger value results in smoother video by sacrificing the latency. A setting of 10 ~ 15 frames can be used generally for most situations

Initialize of IP Address

If a system IP address is lost, the system can be reset to the system default IP address using the reset button in the back side of the system.

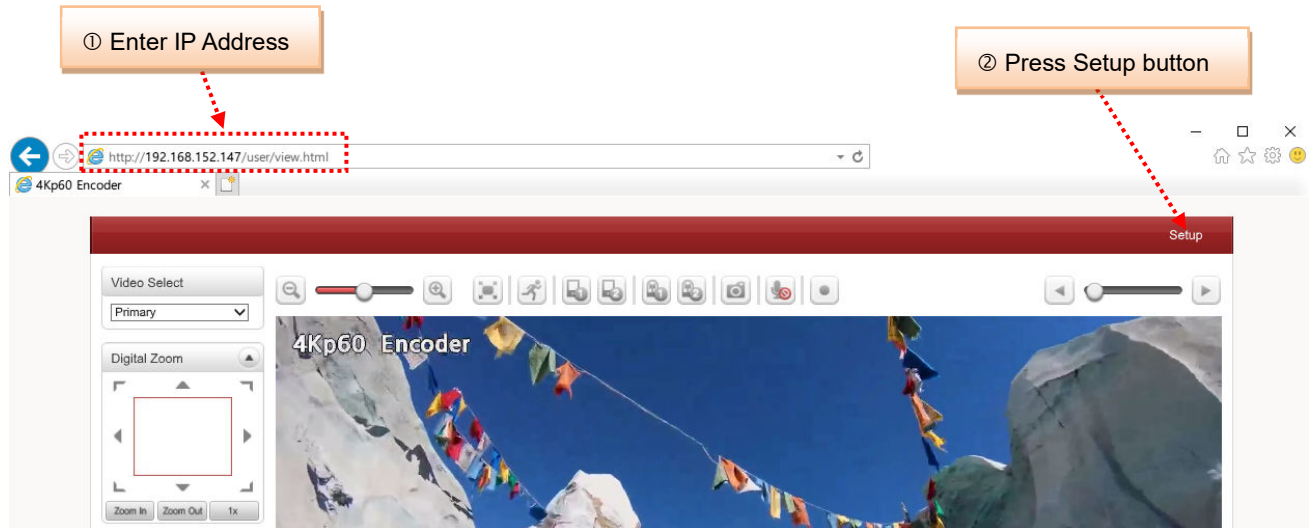
1. While the system is in operation, press the reset button for more than 5 seconds.
2. The system will reboot automatically.
3. Once the system reboots, IP address will be set to the system default as below;

4. Remote Configuration

Using Web Browser

Remote setting is available by using web browser. Enter the IP address of Video Server and a live view screen will appear as below. Press **Setup** button located in the upper right area of the monitoring screen to go to the server setup. For Remote Setting, user should be authorized higher than manager level.



The configurations are grouped into 9 categories: **Video & Audio, Image, Network, Event, Record, Device, PTZ, User, System**. Leaving the page without pressing the **Apply** button, any changes in the page will be discarded.

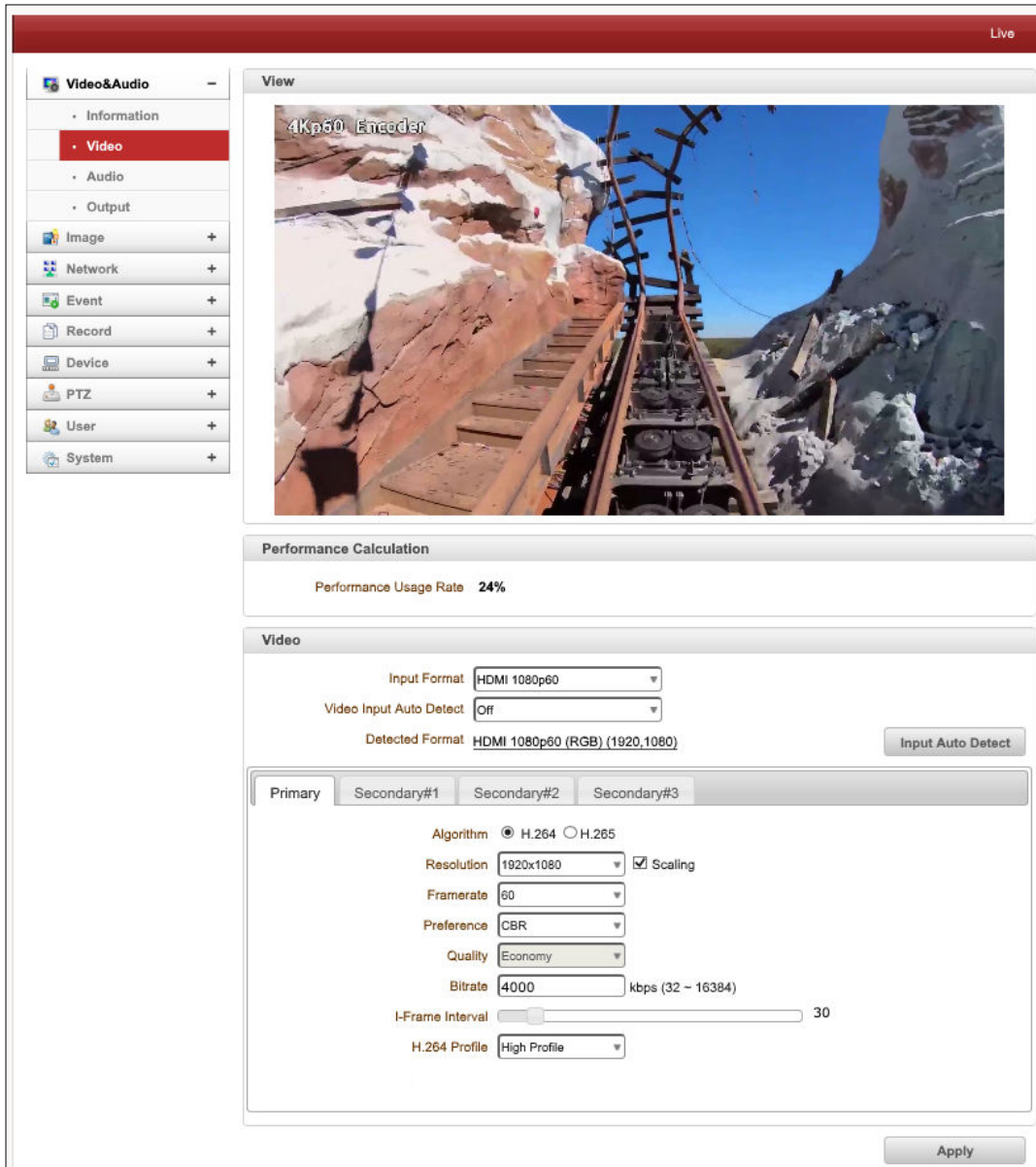

- Video and Audio status showed at this page including Algorithm, Resolution, Bitrate etc.

Video



- **Performance Calculation**

This calculation shows the performance usage rate according to the value set

- **Input Format**

Choose the input format from the list that is matched to the output of the camera or other video source.

- **Video Input Auto Detect**

Full Auto provides fixed resolution as input format. When semi auto is enabled, user can select resolution.

- **Detected Format**

Source and video information are shown and whether it is connected to the Encoder

- **Algorithm**

Select compression algorithm. Note that MJPEG is supported only for Secondary streams.

- **Resolution**

Select video encoding resolution.

Scaling option is used when encoding resolution is different from input resolution. Without Scaling option, input video will be cut according to encoding resolution. On the other hand, if Scaling is selected, input video will be adjusted according to the encoding resolution.

- **Framerate**

Determine the maximum number of frames per second for the video stream.

1,2,3,4,5,6,8,10,15,20,25,30 and 60 frame rate can be selected. The actual frame rate of the video can be less than the maximum frame rate set due to the network bandwidth limitation

- **Preference**

Select encoding mode to control video quality or bitrate: Quality(VBR) or Bit rate(CBR and Hybrid). If 'Bitrate' is selected, the video encoding will be affected by the 'Bitrate' value entered. Therefore, "Bitrate" mode corresponds to CBR (Constant Bit Rate) or Hybrid (Hybrid Constant Bit Rate) encoding. If 'Quality' is selected, the video encoded will be affected by the quality of image selected. Therefore, "Quality" mode corresponds to VBR (Variable Bit Rate) encoding.

- **Quality**

Select Video quality. 8 levels of quality are available.

Quality mode (VBR encoding) tries to encode every frame in a constant quality. Therefore, the resulting bitrate may vary a lot depending on the complexity or activity changes in the input video. It is preferred when constant video quality is required and network bandwidth is enough for delivering the stream of highly varying bitrate.

- **Bitrate**

Determine the bitrate value between 32 ~ 16Mbps.

Bitrate mode (CBR encoding) allows you to set a fixed target bitrate that consumes a predictable amount of bandwidth. In order to keep the bitrate limit, video quality is controlled dynamically according to the complexity or activity changes in the input video.

Bitrate mode (Hybrid encoding) allows you to set a maximum bitrate. Bitrate does not exceed the set bitrate but it can decrease automatically when the scene complexity is decreased. This mode allows you to control the bandwidth efficiently.

- **I-Frame Interval**

Determine I-frame Interval between 1 and 255.

- **H.264 Profile**

Select H.264 Profile: **High Profile** or **Baseline Profile**

The standard defines various sets of capabilities which are referred to as profiles that target specific classes of application.

I. High Profile

The Primary profile for broadcast and disc storage applications are used particularly for high-definition television application.

II. Main Profile

This profile is used for standard-definition digital TV broadcasts that use the MPEG-4 format as defined in the DVB standard.

III. Baseline Profile

Primarily used for low-cost applications that require additional data loss robustness, this profile is sometimes used in video conferencing and mobile application. This profile includes all features that are supported in the constrained baseline profile, plus three additional features that can be used for loss robustness.

- **Secondary #1 ~ #3**

- **Use Quadruple Encode**

Select **ON** to enable to use Secondary #1 ~ #3.

The Secondary #1 ~ #3 video can be viewed on **Live View** window by selecting **Stream number** on Video selection

- **Algorithm**

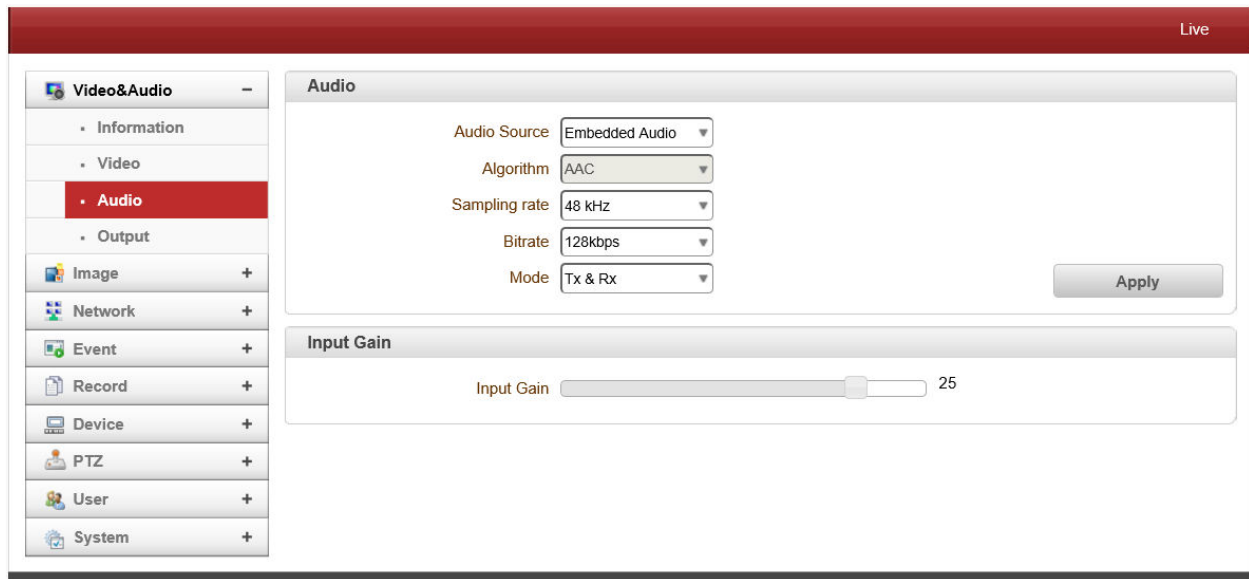
Select H.264, MJPEG or H.265 for the secondary, tertiary or quaternary streaming.

In case of H.264, wither bitrate mode or Quality mode can be selected for Preference mode. On the other hand, MJPEG supports **Quality** mode

- **H.265 Profile**

For a better view of the scene with less buffer, you may select the H.265 profile. Please have in mind that the browsers Chrome, Edge and Mozilla have not yet developed full capability of streaming 100% of H.265 profile. To check the actual H.265 stream, please use a separate video streaming software.

Audio



- **Audio Source**

Select the audio source: Embedded or Analog stereo

- **Algorithm**

Select the audio algorithm: G.711 or AAC

G.711 and AAC from client to server direction are supported. Thus, bidirectional audio communication is supported.

- **Sampling rate**

The sampling rate defines the number of samples per unit of time taken from a continuous signal to make a discrete signal.

- **Bitrate**

Select the bitrate between 32Kbps and 192Kbps when AAC is selected

The sampling rate is fixed to 64KHz for G.711 and is 32KHz, 44.1KHz and 48KHz for AAC respectively. Note that when camera is connected to a decoder, the decoder's audio algorithm should be set identically to transmit audio properly.

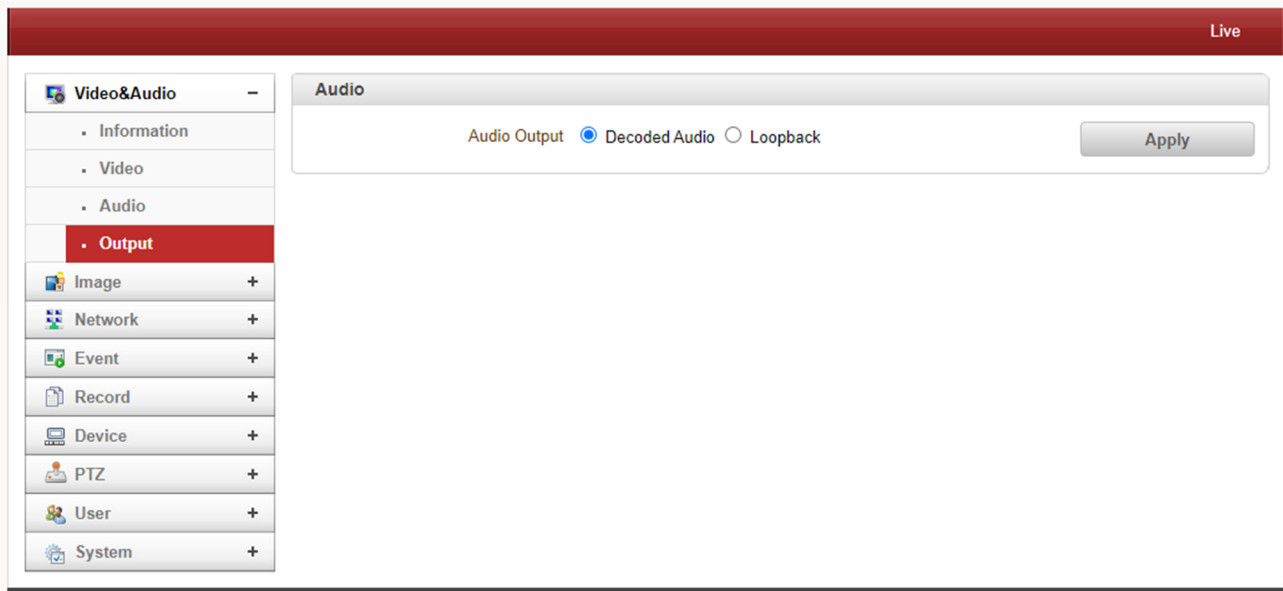

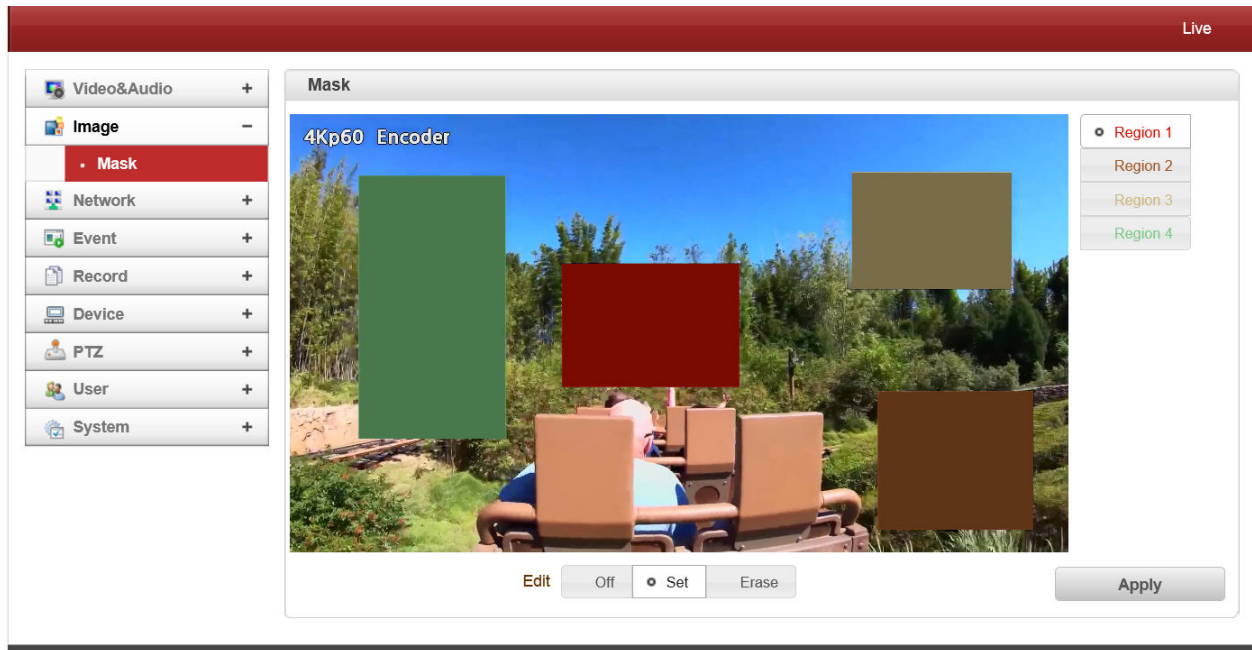

Domain Name System (DNS) is a database system that translates a computer's fully qualified domain name into an IP address. Networked computers use IP addresses to locate and connect to each other, but IP addresses can be difficult for people to remember. For example, on the web, it's much easier to remember the domain name `www.amazon.com` than it is to remember its corresponding IP address (`207.171.166.48`). Each organization that maintains a computer network will have at least one server handling DNS queries. That server, called a name server, will hold a list of all the IP addresses within its network, plus a cache of IP addresses for recently accessed computers outside the network.

- **IPv6**

➤ **Ipv6 Address:** Enter the designated Ipv6 address.

➤ **Ipv6 Subnet Prefix Length:** Enter the bit number of Ipv6 Subnet

➤ **Ipv6 Default Gateway:** Enter the designated Ipv6 gateway.

➤ **Ipv6 Link Local:** Display Ipv6 Link Local.

- **Port**

➤ **Base Port (1025~65535)**

Enter the Base Port number

Network base port is used for communication with remote clients. In order for camera and remote systems to be connected, the port number must be identically configured in camera side and client side.

➤ **HTTP Port (80, 1025~65535)**

Enter HTTP port used for web-based connection.

- **HTTPS Port (443, 1025~65535)**
Enter HTTPS port used secured HTTP connection.
- **RTSP Port (554, 1025~65535)**
Enter RTSP port used for RTSP-based connection. The default TRSP port is 554.
RTSP (Real Time Streaming Protocol) is a standard for media streaming between server and client.
- **Audio Receive Port**
Enter Audio port used for audio transmission from client or other software. Default Audio Receive Port is 2280.
- **MTU Size**
MTU (Maximum Transmit Unit) is the size of the largest protocol data unit that can be communicated in a single network layer transaction. Default value is 1500.
- **Multicast**
The Multicast menu is used for configuring the multicast IP address to which media stream is delivered when a client such as a Decoder, VMS or NVR software is connected in multicast mode. The multicast IP address selection range is between 224.0.0.0 and 239.255.255.255. The selection can be used only when media protocol is set to Multicast.

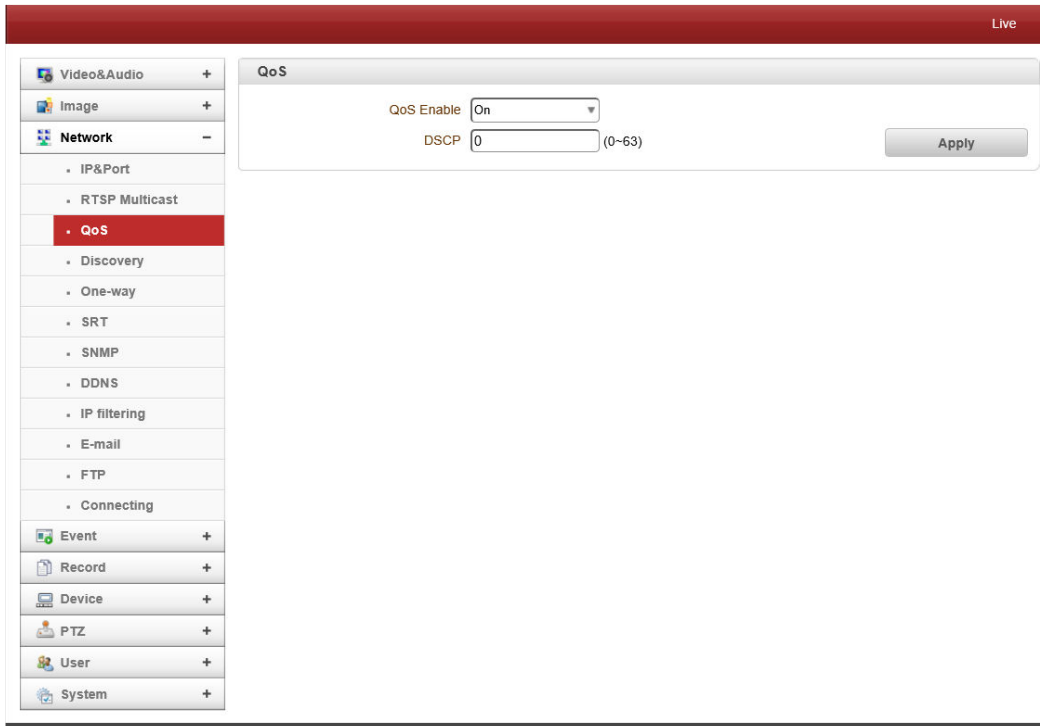



QoS



- QoS (Quality of Service) guarantees a certain level of a specified resource to selected traffic on a network. A QoS-aware network prioritizes network traffic and provides greater network reliability by controlling the amount of bandwidth and application may use. Using DSCP (Differentiated Services Codepoint) values, Video Server can mark the following types of traffic: live video, event/alarm traffic and management traffic.

By the setting **UPNP** to ON, it allows the discovery by the client according to UPNP (Universal Plug and Play) protocol.
- **Zeroconf**
By setting **Zeroconf** to ON, it allows the discovery by the client according to zeroconf protocol.
- **WS Discovery**
Discovery function based on web service is enabled. It allows the discovery by the client SW which is supporting Onvif.

Transport stream specifies a container format encapsulating packetized elementary streams, with error correction and stream synchronization features for maintaining transmission integrity when the signal is degraded. - **Related settings are as follows:**
 - **Destination IP** : Set the IP Address of the destination system which will receive MPEG-TS stream.
 - **Destination Port** : Set the Port of the Destination system which will receive MPEG-TS stream.

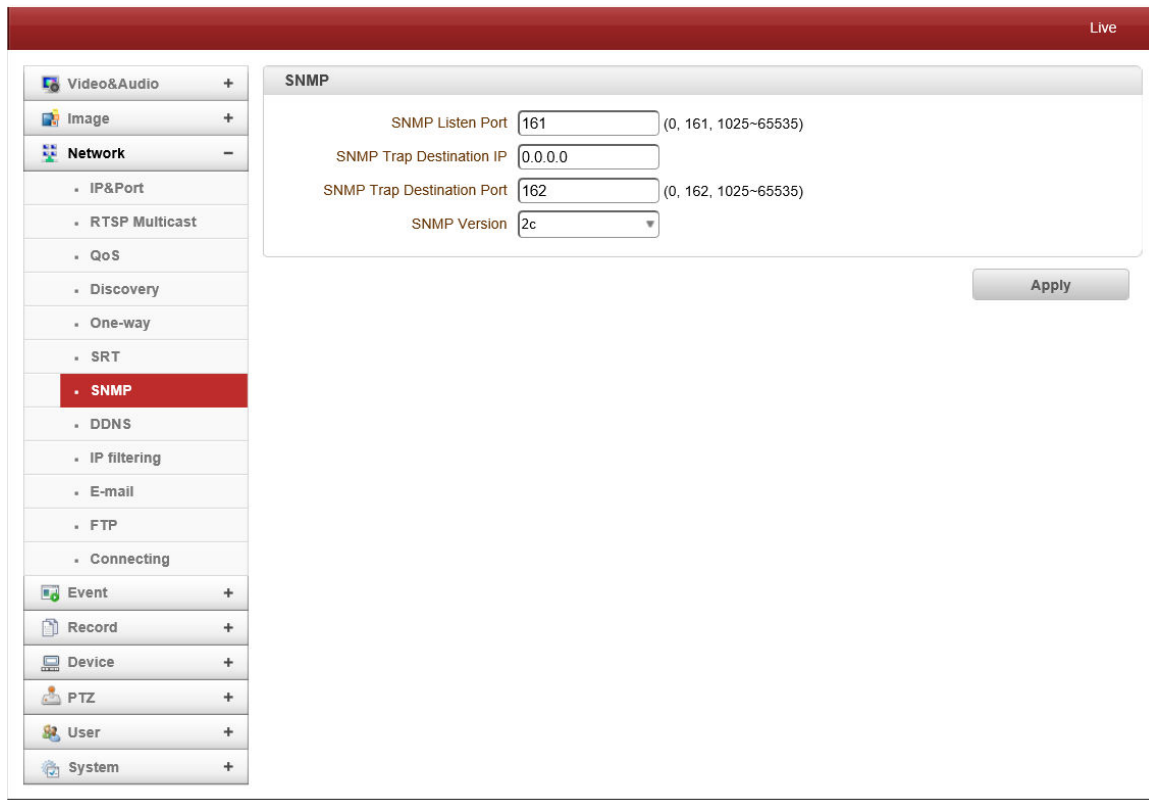
- **RTMP (Real-Time Messaging Protocol)** is for streaming audio, video and data over internet between a Flash player and a server. (H.265 RTMP streaming is not supported)
- **Destination IP** : Set the IP Address of the destination system which will receive RTMP Stream.

SRT (Secure Reliable Transport).

- SRT is an open source project which is Video and Audio transmission protocol developed by SRT Alliance. SRT optimizes streaming performance across unpredictable networks, such as the Internet, by dynamically adapting to the real-time network conditions between transport endpoints.

- **Listener** : The SRT stream acts like a server (Decoder) and listens & waits for clients to connect to it.
- **Caller** : The SRT stream acts like a client and connects to a server listening and waiting for an incoming call.
- **Destination Port** : Specifies the UDP destination port for the SRT stream.
- **Secure** : Enables AES encryption and specifies the key length, either: None, AES-128, or AES-256

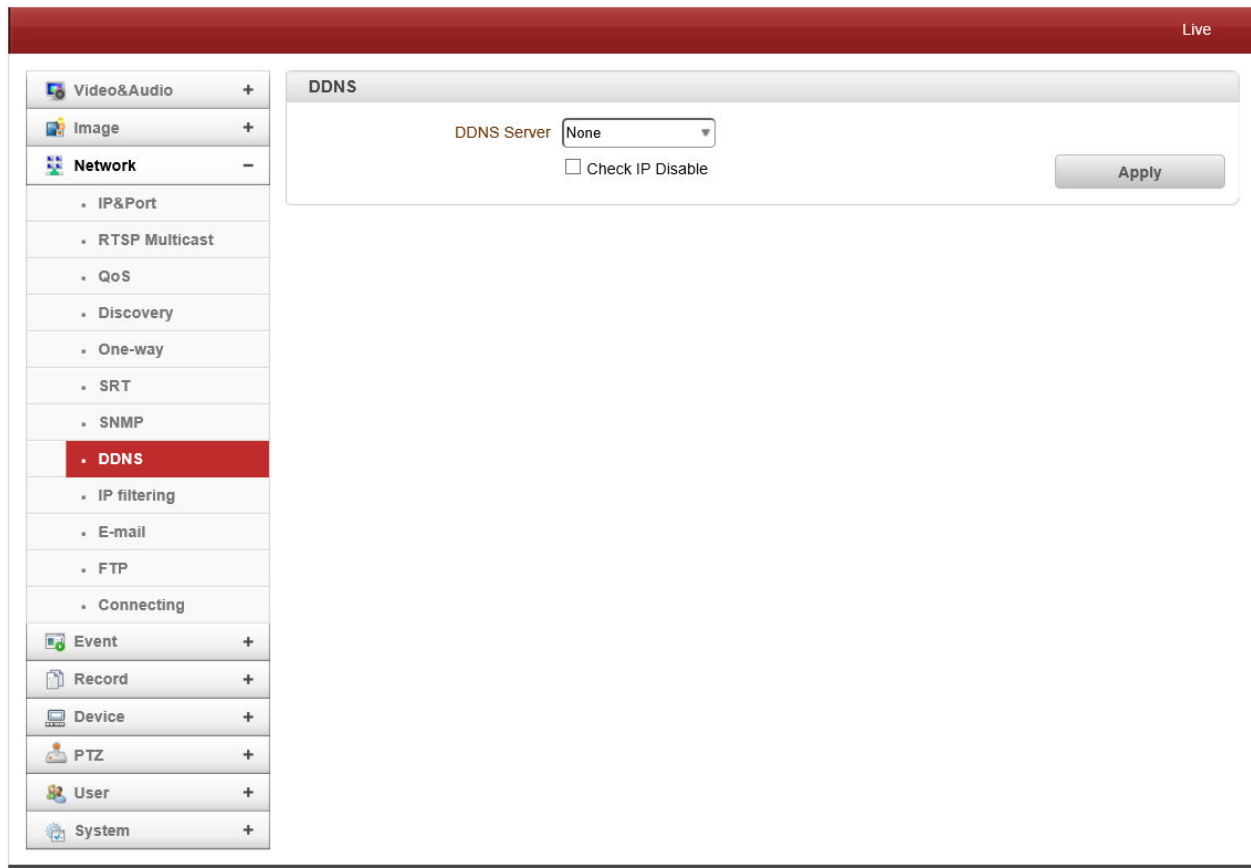
This Setup is used for SNMP (Simple Network Management Protocol). It is compatible to both SNMPv1 and SNMPv2c. Settings for using SNMP are as following;

- **SNMP Listen Port (0, 161, 1025 ~ 65535)**
The port is for connecting external device when system operates as a SNMP client. SNMP is not used by setting 0 value.

For example, a router could send a message if one of its redundant power supplies fails or a printer could send an SNMP trap when it is out of paper

Dynamic DNS is a method, protocol, or network service that provides the capability for a networked device, such as a router or computer system using the Internet Protocol Suite, to notify a domain name server to change, in real time (ad-hoc) the active DNS configuration of its configured hostnames, addresses or other information stored in DNS.

- **Vdyn**

Vdyn is a DDNS service provided by Visionica (<http://visionica.com>). No further configuration is required for using this service. It internally uses MAC address for the registration. When it succeeds, the domain name of the form 001C63A607EC.visionica.info is displayed on Current Domain entry of Network page. E-mail setting is not mandatory.

- **Check IP Disable**

If “Check IP Disable” is selected, it will skip to check its own IP. In fixed IP mode, the set IP will be registered on DDNS server. In DHCP mode, dynamically assigned IP will be registered on DDNS server. Normally **Check IP Disable** should be unchecked in order to obtain public IP in the network.

Since it is possible to control multiple PTZ cameras or receivers over a single control line, each camera or receiver will be assigned with a unique ID. Enter PTZ ID of a camera or receiver to control. The ID value range can be between 0 and 255.

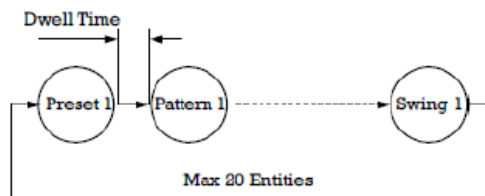

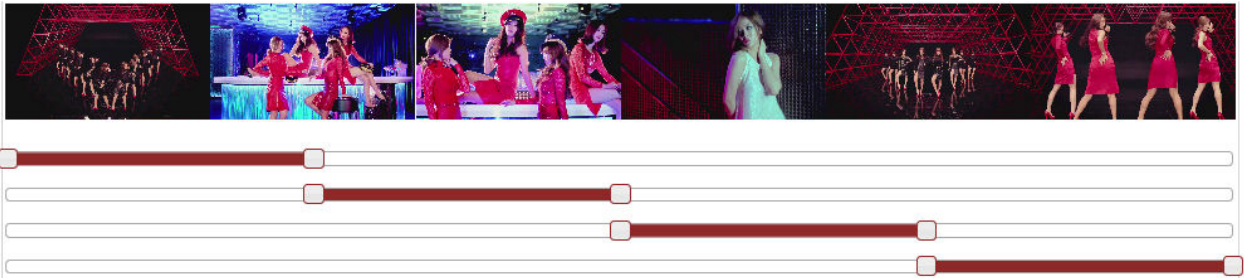

- **Authentication Type**

HTTP authentication based on RFC 2617(HTTP Authentication: Basic and Digest Access Authentication) is supported.

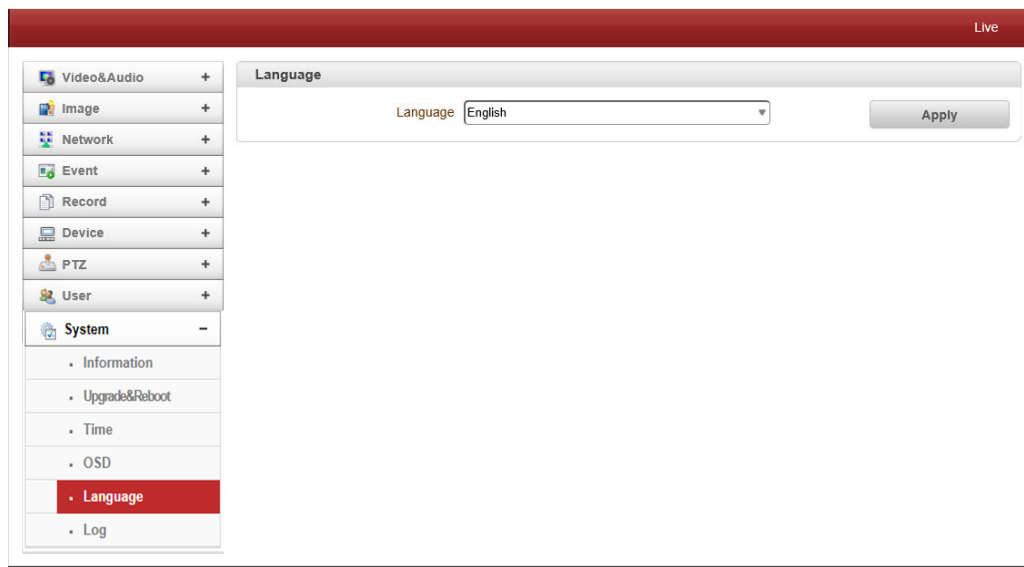
